

Implementation: How do we achieve our aims?

Through weekly lessons with a specialist music teacher and daily singing in worship, music forms an important part of life at Keevil school. The curriculum offers a broad balance of topics and the language and skills used in the subject are regularly revisited to embed learning.

The music curriculum

Singing is a fundamental part of the music curriculum. Songs are incorporated into every topic and often form the basis for musical learning. We subscribe to 'Sing Up' which provides an endless repertoire of songs. We also use their curriculum planning for EYFS and KS1 as all aspects of our 'intent' are incorporated in to each topic.

Music is taught with a <u>spiral</u> <u>curriculum.</u> The interrelated dimensions of music remain the same from EYFS to Y6 but knowledge, understanding and vocabulary of each musical feature is developed as the children get older. The children have several opportunities to **perform** throughout their time at Keevil. EYFS and KS1 take part in a Christmas Nativity. Year 3 and 4 perform a Christmas concert and Years 5 and 6 produce an annual show. These performances take place in the local church, village hall and a local care home.

At Keevil, we offer all children in years 3 and 4 the opportunity to learn a wind instrument for a whole year, for free, as part of the government's <u>'First Access'</u> scheme. Throughout this project, the children develop their understanding of written music and increase their performance skills. Each term a new <u>'Piece of the Term</u>' is played at the start and end of Worship. These pieces have been chosen from a range of genres and periods in music history with the aim of broadening the children's <u>listening experience</u>. These tunes will have a connection with the 'Artwork of the Term' which is also displayed in Worship.

<u>Music Technology</u> opportunities can be found in the curriculum map. Either through dedicated topics or through one-off 'experience' lessons. Whenever possible we try to provide musical experiences from <u>external</u> <u>providers</u>. This can include shows, concerts and workshops. One to one lessons are available on a range of woodwind instruments and guitar. These are delivered during the school day by specialist instrument teachers who are self-employed. Subsidy is available towards lesson fees and instrumental hire for SEND and Pupil Premium children. As pupils progress they will have the option of taking graded exams and joining local ensembles.

Keevil school has a very good selection of <u>musical resources</u> which allows us to fulfil the music curriculum. Our trolley contains a comprehensive selection of high quality untuned percussion. We have a class set of glockenspiels so pupils don't need to share.
We also have a small electric piano and a set of Boomwhackers. We have a class set of headphones for music technology lessons.

Children are given the opportunity to <u>compose</u> <u>and improvise</u> throughout the curriculum. They are encouraged to consider and include different musical features while creating music for different purposes.

Keevil school is part of the **Trowbridge Music Cluster** which means we can benefit from workshops and opportunities that are often subsidised. We also participate in the annual Trowbridge music festival.
